Why is LWP needed?

- We all experience some one-off, emergency or unexpected costs at some point (lumpy expenditures)
- Low-incomes often don't allow households to afford the basics, let alone save for these cots
- Failing to help with these costs can lead to bigger crises that are more costly to the state

When a cost becomes a crisis...

- If parents provide essential goods for their families, there is an increased risk that their children could be taken into care
- Without rent in advance or funding for essential furniture and white goods, the risk of homelessness increases
- If faulty electrical items and cookers cannot be replaced, there is an increased risk of domestic fire
- If health conditions deteriorate because of a lack of basic items, more pressure on both NHS and social care budgets
- If ex-offenders cannot establish themselves in the community, re-offending rates are likely to increase

The story to date...

- April 2013 social fund ends and DWP provide grant to councils for local welfare provision. No ringfence, but settlement letter providing steer to councils
- Dec 2013 local government finance settlement indicate grant funding will end in April 2015
- Jan 2014 DWP announced that 'from April 2015, local authorities will be able to offer this support (LWAS) from within the general fund'.
- 'Keep the Safety Net' campaign launches
- Sept 2014 Government settle a judicial review and agree to make a fresh decision on LWP funding

The story to date...

- Nov 14 Consultation on future funding
- **Dec 14** Provisional local government finance settlement indicates councils should spend £129m on LWP. But doesn't provide any cash...
- Jan 14 Final local government finance settlement allocates £74m to councils to "assist them dealing with pressures on local welfare and health and social care"

The future of LWP

- No ring-fence -> local decision on provision
- No guidance / steer
- No monitoring
- Cuts to budget
- Blurring of purpose "This support is often called "local welfare provision" – an umbrella term, or shorthand, used to describe the variety of local schemes and response." Lord Ahmed, HOL debate 10th Feb 2015
- Little expectation of reliability of funding

But...

- Councils using underspend from previous years to continue schemes
- Local figure = local accountability? Opportunity for local campaigning?

Our calls

- Funding restored to 2013/14 levels
- To be funded by a DWP grant to recognise the role of schemes as part of the social security system
- Fund to be ring-fenced
- Minimum monitoring standards
- Clarity on how ongoing funding decisions will be made
